The World of Pronouns: The Secret Heroes of Words

Learning Objective: Students can recognize personal, demonstrative, and interrogative pronouns and use them correctly in sentences.

1. Personal Pronouns

Words that take the place of names of people.

Examples: I, You, He/She/It, We, You, They.

Sentence: Did **you** read many books today?

2. Demonstrative Pronouns

Words that point to objects and take their place.

Examples: This, That, These, Those.

Sentence: Can you leave **this** on the table?

3. Interrogative Pronouns

Words that take the place of nouns by asking questions.

Examples: Who, What, Where, Which one, How many.

Sentence: **What** did you buy from the market today?
